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

"I remember the apple tree we planted in the garden we cleared from my mother's dandelion field. Years later, my mother gave me an apple tree branch that had been cut off by a storm in the hope that I would make a sculpture from it. The branch hung in the corner of my studio for years until I finally turned it into Mom's Apple Tree Branch. It was then that I understood how deep personal experience people can have with trees, and I became curious about what kind of tree-related stories other families had."

2. In the Arms of a Tree 2025 sculpture birch, rowan

"The tree grew in front of the kitchen window and was a very beautiful tree, but due to its vigorous growth and overhanging branches, it ended up being too big for its place, or too "sprawling". The hanging branches were overhanging the roof, the gutters and the footpath along the side of the house. You had to sort of dive through it, which was no fun, especially when pushing a wheelchair. Cutting it down seemed only to enhance the growth, so after many years of deliberation we cut it down. Fortunately, we still had another, more conventional, domestic rowan tree in the garden!" - Sanna

"Virpi lives in a 100-year-old house in Ilmajoki. A long birch alley leads to the house, which was planted in the 1940s when Virpi's grandfather Eino lived there. Some of the old birch trees had to be cut down because of rot, and I was able to get a few pieces of trunk for my work." - Tiina Laasonen

4. Swing spatial sculpture 2025 Juniper, Birch, Bird cherry, Larch, Alder, Apple tree, Rowan, Beech, Sycamore, Oak, Tar alder, Spruce, Buckthorn, Maple

"I've been planning to cut down the apple tree in the kitchen window for several years now, but I can't resist, because it always starts the summer with a lovely blossom." - Maarit

"I find it so difficult to cut down old trees, because they are somehow so beautiful. I've always liked all the old trees on the property. I've had to cut them down and it's always weighed on my heart. I made a couple of tables and benches out of one pine tree." - Antti

"We had recently moved, and I bought two Tuias to put in a pot on either side of the front door just before Christmas. I thought they would die in the winter anyway but was surprised to find they were still alive in the spring. I then planted them in the flower bed in front of the house, and there they grew for at least 15 years." - Eija

"I have pieces of Tuias that I can't find a use for. I turned the Tuia into a mullet for Tuija but that wood is not really suitable for lathe. They can go if you have a use for them. They'd burn well, but there's no fireplace. They are dry." - Seppo

"We dumped two logs and they are ready to be picked up. The trunks are male and female, the buckthorn have different sexs. I have grown them myself from seed some time ago. We didn't cut off the top yet, because I thought there were some nice parts, Teijo promised to cut them off at your arrival if necessary." - Elina

"Nina and Matti's apple tree have been very productive and produced delicious apples. Its last blossom was stunningly beautiful, Nina photographed it. A late summer storm toppled the tree, which was full of apple cores. It was a shame, but luckily Nina remembered the advertisement for the tree campaign and contacted." - Tiina Laasonen

"Macke and his family bought the house partly because of the oak tree growing in the yard. A strong spring storm at the height of the peak of the covid times ripped off a branch of the oak tree. Macke offered the wood material to me to be used in the works." - Tiina Laasonen

"Liisa and Timo's old garden has large trees that occasionally have to be pruned and even removed due to their age. From there I have got good pieces of trunk from bird cherry, rowan and apple trees for my artwork. On my last visit, they dug up an oak tree from the ground, grown from a Spanish acorn." - Tiina Laasonen

"In the front yard of Ritva and Arvo's house there was a large and old juniper tree that had to be cut down. Ritva told me that it was such a nuisance to cut it down, but it would be a joy if something could be done from it. The juniper dried for a long time ago and part of it ended up in another work in 2022 and the rest I have used for the Swing work."

"Irma once brought up an un-split and rounded piece of a deciduous tree about a metre long that they had used as a flower stand. They were getting rid of it, so I accepted the offer. I stored the tree bollard and other things in the study with it until recently I remembered it and dug it out of storage. It transform to three beautiful pearls."

"Jaakko always surprises me by bringing me a precious piece of dry wood. It's usually beech, which doesn't grow in Jaakko's yard. Sometimes Jaakko would tell me that the beech was from a dismantled central European pallet. This treasure, too, has been refined into a pearl." - Tiina Laasonen

"Jouni donated birch planks he had dried in his attic as material for his work. The birch had grown slowly in the yard of his house in Raahe. It was a dense birch tree" - Tiina Laasonen

"We played in the tree all our childhood. It was our main playground. There were different places and branches in the tree, which we had named Observatory A, B and C. The tree had a precise hierarchy. The oldest children sat on the top branches."

"Sometimes I went up the tree all by myself, without the older children. Then I could go on whichever branch I wanted. If I was angry or sad, I would climb up there and sit by myself. I'd look at the street and think about everything. I'd sit for a while, calm down and then come away. I also hugged the tree many times."

"We were constantly looking at whether we can go any higher, whether there are even better branches somewhere. And if we'd been to the shop, we went there to eat the sweets. It was particularly fun to jump out of the tree to the side of the street. One branch grew on the footpath and we also tried to get to the tree through it. We jumped and grabbed the branch and tried to pull ourselves up. The white fence on the side of the yard made it easier to climb the tree."

"We moved away when I was a teenager. Every time I passed by, I would look at it and remember fondly my childhood. It was sad when it was cut down and the place is now empty, but wonderful that the tree was there for my childhood."

"In Vaasa, in the yard of Klemetinkatu 9, a large Eastern crack-willow grew between the houses. Residents thought it had been planted in the 1950s. Unfortunately for everyone, the tree had to be cut down because of a drainage renovation in a neighbouring house. The decision was made easier by the knowledge that the tree will end up as a work of art." - Tiina Laasonen

6. Happy Ever After sculpture 2025
Pear tree

"Eija and Timo planted a pear tree in the yard of their family home on their 10th wedding anniversary. When the tree was still small, it had to be moved to a more sheltered spot. On the southern wall of the house, it grew and produced pears. The tree had to be pruned occasionally because of a disease that caused the leaves to turn brown. The resilient tree grew new branches until it was finally decided to cut it down after its 21st anniversary. Eija was overjoyed at the idea that the tree would live on as a work of art." - Tiina Laasonen

The tree remembers where it grew, and so do I. I remember every tree and lilac bush in our yard. In them I have found my love for the tree as a living organism, piled material, and medium for art

Tiina Laasonen explores humanity and the connection between human beings and natural world. Through her art as well as the process of working Laasonen reflects on the emotional bond associated with trees, the way they connect to our memories, personal histories and identities. The works in the exhibition are made from wood collected through an open call. Local people in Seinäjoki, Lapua and Vaasa donated material for the art works. While collecting the wood material for the art works, the artist took notes on the memories and stories related to it.

The stories and memories later became central to the exhibition: they are the subject of the art works as well as the starting point for the formal language of the exhibition. Large wooden strips, knits and beads symbolize continuity in the chain of generations and time. The works are interconnected to the region through their stories and material.

The artist herself still remembers how she and her mother planted an apple tree in the garden cleared from a dandelion field. Years later, Laasonen's mother gave an apple tree branch cut by a storm to her, hoping that the branch could be turned into a work of art. In the end, the branch got a new life as Mother's Apple Tree Branch, an artwork on display in the exhibition.

TIINA LAASONEN

Tiina Laasonen (b. 1968) works with sculpture and spatial art. In her work, craftsmanship and traditional woodworking techniques are united with contemporary sculpture. Laasonen works with wood by sawing, planing, gluing, carving, and turning. The different shapes, properties, and the warmth and softness of wood, make wood Laasonen's favorite material.

Laasonen graduated from the Kankaanpää Art School as a sculptor in 1993. Laasonen has also worked as an environmental artist and made several public art works. Her works have been featured in numerous museum and gallery exhibitions in Finland and abroad, and her works belong to many museum and public collections. Laasonen has been awarded the Jaakkoo Cultural Award in 2019, the Ostrobothnia Art Council's prize in 2017, and the Young Ostrobothnian Artist prize in 1997. She is a member of the Association of Finnish Sculptors.
