

Pisto.

Pisto. (Stitch) is a group exhibition of five contemporary artists at Vintti in the Kunsthalle Seinäjoki. The exhibition has been curated by the Kunsthalle Seinäjoki and it was created at junction of two observations by the program team planning the exhibition program. Even before moving to the Kalevan Navetta, four policies were developed around which the repertoire will be built. In the case of Pisto., one of the policies specially highlighted is Tila (the Space), which includes not only the spatial and architectural features of the exhibition spaces, but also the historical layers. In other words, the fascinating story of the Kalevan Navetta. The 130-year-old house has been home to a baize factory from 1909 to 1929. In addition, the arts and cultural centre's community includes the handicraft-inspired Taito Etelä-Pohjanmaa with its shop and courses offered. As the past and the present of the premises radiate handicrafts and textiles as material, these themes were also addressed from the perspective of contemporary art.

Another observation was that there seemed to be many interesting young contemporary artists using textiles in their own way. Curiosity arose to delve more closely into contemporary textile art. What are the characteristics that textile as a material brings into the work of artists? What does the playfulness that seems to be related to creation tell us? To the Pisto. exhibition Kunsthalle Seinäjoki team has curated five young artists, who are united not only by textile as a material and the imaginative use of handicraft techniques, but also by contemporary and difficult social issues and the sequence of thoughts related to tradition and the eternal continuum.

Many meanings of recycling

The artists are connected by the use of discovered and recycled materials. This expresses practicality and ecological pursuits, but also has broader meanings. Anni Haunia's yarns from various people bring a personal level and emotional relation to the work, which is emphasized by the description of the origin of the materials in the work information. Her dangling and sprawling textile weaves explicate the process-like nature of creating, which also includes the unexpectedness of finding materials, the slowness of hand-knitting, and the unfolding of feelings, shapes, and colors. As such, art emerges as the outcome of various material and social currents. From Haunia we can see two textile weaves in the exhibition, whose poetic names stimulate their meaning and add many possibilities of interpretation. On one hand, the artist leads us to reflect on change and symptoms of present; on the other hand, to reflect on the meaning of touch.

Touching and feeling a material are central in the works of Pisto. artists. From **Ilai Elias Lehto** we can see three spatial works in the exhibition. The felted Kehto ("the Cradle") and the Hautomo ("the Incubator") built on top of the dumpster dived pool table invite to a gentle touch. The main technique of Lehto, who finds versatile uses for textiles, is wool felting, in which he does not pursue flawless technical implementation but values the unpredictable features of felting work. The process of creation includes lumps and surprising holes that are given the opportunity to guide the work and to influence the artist's plans. The third work is a crooked hunting memory or a trophy-wall utilizing recycled plush toys.

The work highlights the association between hunting and the destruction of soft toys typical of a child. The authority of well-established norms can be seen in the fact that in hunting the "destruction" of an animal is considered normal, while in children's play it is not. Lehto explores the material that fills our lives, how it circulates and how it is consumed as an expression of identity and a preserver of feelings.

The artists' ideas highlight how our lives center on textiles. Textile products can be found everywhere in everyday life and textile is linked to many global issues. **Anna-Karoliina Vainio**'s starting points for using textile are related to softness, comfort and continuing of tradition with a contemporary and feminist touch. The rya works, bursting with yarn and woven into jute fabric, convey a powerful symbol of the contexts of paradise and world creation. Peace and harmony seem to be possible. However, especially when brought to the present, and according to the impression left by the larger work Paradise on Your Skin, the gentle moment is in danger of falling to pieces.

Material-orientedness meets assertiveness

The use of textiles leads artists into material-oriented work that reaches towards neo-materialistic dimensions. Working with textiles is a slow process, at the same time, the relationship with the work is a close one and the work is influenced by life and experiences. For Erika Hirsimäki, working with textile is integral both in terms of its historical fascination and handicraft. In her woven and felted jacquard fabrics, the brightness of form is combined with unscrupulous content. Ideas critical of the society, such as tensions related to animal rights, can be seen in powerful works that can be read as a narrative. The works that borrow methods from conceptual art create confusion about the destiny of the character Tipi, Tweety, from the animation world. Hirsimäki combines textiles with three-dimensionality which can be seen notably in the sculptural piece Silent Service. In this work, Tipi's story has ended either as a funeral never held or as food for others.

In the case of technical execution, contemporary textile art is determined by the dynamics of wild experimentation and slow execution.

In **Ninni Luhtasaari**'s works, this appears as a contrast between spontaneousness and slowness of work. She sketches quickly her embroidery work on the bottom canvas and then continues to work slowly – the sketch lines must be covered. In the works, the yarns, pearls and sequins draw non-human creatures acting or feeling in a human-like. The highly coloured works that make you smile convey a reflection on the unbalanced relation between humans and other living beings, suitable for posthumanistic thinking.

On playfulness, lightness

The playfulness arising from the exhibition's initial information and considerations is especially evident in the playful approach to material and technology. However, this playfulness is located on the background of reflecting on world situation and the place of humans. The way the exhibition is hanged highlights the contrast between playfulness and seriousness by choosing deliciously pastel colours on the hanging walls. The majestic stylishness of Vintti and the almost sacral atmosphere has been coupled with summer lightness to the exhibition experience.

However, the exhibition should not be viewed lightly. The nurturing nature of textile creates a contradiction between concern and criticism about the role of textile in modern world. This perspective connects artists and adds an awakening distortion to the exhibition's historic connections: the baize factory manufactured fabrics for actual needs a hundred years ago, while nowadays textile waste and acquisition of materials are major global problems.

Anni Haunia

Anni Haunia's (b. 1995) works are wiggly, hanging textile weaves. In addition to be looked at, her works can also be touched. Anni uses traditional craft techniques: weaving, crocheting and sewing. She creates the works in a simple handlooms that she builds herself. Anni describes her work method rather as wiggling drawing than traditional rug making.

Erika Hirsimäki (b. 1993) is material intensive visual artist. They work with soft materials, but use also photo and video. They are interested in material: where it comes from, how and to who it affects geopolitically and historically. Erika relies on the accelerating and at times stagnant tensions created by their emotions and turns them into fictional narratives and characters, that often address a very different kind of world or reflect pictures of it.

Ninni Luhtasaari


